The Gold Rush Era (1850s–1860s)

The Era of Steam Liners (1875–1920)

The Union Steam Ship Company (established in 1875) monopolized and streamlined the trans-Tasman trade, providing reliable passenger and mail services between Melbourne and major New Zealand ports like Wellington, Auckland, and Bluff. [[1](#), [3](#), [4](#)]
